## Selectmen

### Selectmen's Meeting Minutes September 6, 2016

Selectmen Present: Raymond Poulin, Andrea Reichert, Mike Senecal; Present: Stacie Rundlett, Mike Malesky, Kip Poulin, Wayne Rundlett, Brian Rundlett, Gary Agren, Marilyn Gorman, Ron Lindner-Demers, Cheryl Knighton, Tom and Justin Villaci

1. Andrea called the meeting to order at 6:30 pm.
2. Mike Sencal motioned to accept the minutes as written, Raymond seconded and all were in favor.

### 3. Department Heads

- a. Gary reviews with the board projects to be done. Gary discussed with the board a complaint from Bennett Hill Road. Stacie was asked to call the resident and relay what will be taking place regarding the brush cutting on the road. There was a discussion regarding the town right of ways on all the roads. Most roads are a three rod or four rod road. A three rod road is 49.5 feet in width. A four rod road is 66 feet wide. These distances are within the towns' right of way. There was a brief discussion regarding brush cutting on roadways and land owners doing the cutting themselves. Andrea asked Gary if he would be willing to assist with a sand/salt shed project. Gary agreed to be a part of it.
- b. Kip reviewed the bidding for the old rescue with the board. He also reviewed with the board the generator that was recently installed. There was a brief discussion regarding the old generator and putting it out to bid. There was a brief discussion regarding a dry hydrant. Andrea reminded Kip that the budget process will be starting soon.
- c. Brian reviewed with the Board regarding an upcoming Planning Board agenda. Brian also briefed the board on a potential proposal for a new business that may come to New Portland.
- d. Mike Malesky reviewed with the board seven abatements and five supplemental bills. The board reviewed and signed all documentation.

### 5. Items by the Public

- a. Tom Villaci approached the board regarding ATVs and secondary roadways. There was a lengthy discussion regarding Tom's proposal for the Board of Selectmen to authorize ATV's and utility vehicles to use the secondary roads to access ATV trails in abutting towns. The board asked that Tom get some more information regarding his proposal and present it to the board before it would be considered.

### 4. Items by the Manager

Stacie presented payroll warrants and Accounts Payable Warrant for the board to review and sign.

### 6. Items by the Board of Selectmen

Stacie also reviewed with the board the status of 52 River Road and the clean-up. The owner is due to have property cleaned the last week in September. Stacie briefed the board the status of 210 Lemon Stream Road. She would update the board on the matter when more information is provided. Stacie also updated the status of 34 River Road. Andrea asked for financials to be on the next agenda.

Brian asked the board if anyone knew to whom the baseball equipment belonged that was currently being stored in the old fire station in the West. The mice have been destroying some of the equipment. He asked if it could be donated to other little leagues. All the board members were in agreement to do so.

Stacie also updated the board on another complaint about the property abutting the Wire Bridge and the turnaround being blocked off by the property owner.

Mike Senecal. motioned to adjourn, Raymond seconded and all were in favor.

1. Andrea called the meeting to order at 6:30 pm.
2. Andrea motioned to accept the updated guidelines for the General Assistance Ordinance, provided by the State of Maine, Raymond seconded and all were in favor.
3. Raymond motioned to accept the minutes as written, Andrea seconded and all were in favor.
4. The board members reviewed the two applications that were submitted for the Assessor's Agent position. They were Mike Malesky and Hamlin Associates Inc. Mike Senecal. motioned to hire Mike Malesky for the position of Assessor's Agent Raymond seconded and all were in favor.
5. Items by the Manager

Andrea asked for a breakdown of the miscellaneous revenue that have come in. ## Selectmen's Meeting Minutes for October 4, 2016

1. Andrea called the meeting to order at 6:31 pm.
2. Raymond motioned to accept the minutes as written, Andrea seconded and all were in favor.
3. Department Heads
  - a. Mike M. briefed the board on status of things within the assessing office.
  - b. Kip updated the board on recent purchases. They purchased 20 used SCBA's. A used thermal camera. Kip briefed the board that Kingfield's engine was down and New Portland would be called if needed for Kingfield. He briefed the board on the calls to date. There was a brief discussion regarding the squad that has been listed twice on govdeal.com. It was agreed to lower the price slightly to see if any bids would come in. There was a discussion regarding the old generator and possibly offering it to the New Portland Community Library as a donation. Kip will approach the Library Board regarding that as the selectmen were in agreement that it would be a generous offer. Kip briefed the board regarding dry wells in town. There was a discussion, and it was unanimously agreed that it would be a liability issue to pump water into wells by the fire department, and we would not be doing this for residents as it has been requested by some. Stacie updated Kip and the board that the first installment for Township Fire Coverage would be received soon from Somerset County. Kip briefly discussed with the board the possibility of installing a dry hydrant on Gilman Pond Road on Gabe Clark's property.
4. Items by the Manager
  - a. The board reviewed and signed payroll and accounts payable warrants.
5. Items by the Board of Selectmen
  - a. Gilbert Taylor updated the board on the status of the sand/salt pile. There was a brief discussion regarding the first installment to Gilbert on October 15. The board members would inspect once the pile was completely ready and let Stacie know if he was all set to receive a check.

There was a brief discussion regarding the clean-up at 52 River Rd. Raymond motioned to adjourn, Andrea seconded and all were in favor.

## School Board Meeting

The October school board meeting was held at the Embden Community Center.

Minutes: The minutes of the August board meeting were approved after seventeen minutes of discussion and debate. At issue was the wording in the minutes regarding the tuition paid by Athens students attending school in RSU 74. Apparently, Athens students attend RSU 74 at 80% of the state subsidy cost. Some board members and citizens in the audience were unhappy with this, as they believed it could set a bad precedent for the future. Some Embden residents voiced displeasure that Athens students received a discounted rate, while they have contended that Embden's share has been too high. Other board members believed that it was helpful to bring additional students into the district and that the 80% figure could be revisited before 2017-2018. The August minutes eventually were approved.

The September board meeting minutes were approved quickly.

Superintendent's Report: Mr. Beverage said that there were two formal proposals to clean the CHS gym ceiling and work to the CHS gym walls. The new CHS sign has arrived, but it is damaged. A decision will be made soon whether the sign can be used or sent back. Negotiations are ongoing with the company.

Mr. Beverage received a letter from the Department of Education (DOE) regarding the Embden withdrawal plan. The timeline has been extended until January 1.

He told the board that at the upcoming Maine State Management Association (MSMA) Fall Conference collaboration among school districts will be promoted.

Mr. Beverage expressed some reservations about the Adult Ed Program. He said that current staff is working to move forward with the program. He hoped it would be up and running soon.

He said that Maine Labor laws will create a problem for support staff employees who wish to coach. The problem will be overtime laws, and the likelihood that under the law any support staff employee who coached would have to be paid time and a half.

He said that the Finance Committee will meet next week, and they will go over the recent audit.

A board member asked him for a list of superintendent agreements, and he promised to get that to the board.

Administrator Reports: Miss Butler told that board that Fire Safety Week and Bus Safety Week were coming soon. Seven practicum students are in the district now. Teachers have been studying assessment data. Garret Schenck has implemented an RTI program similar to what is being used in grades 6 - 8.

Mr. Weggler told the board that the 6 - 8 RTI program is going very well. He said that the recent eighth grade trips to Flagstaff were highly successful. Earlier in the week the sixth grade students went on a trip to the Gulf of Maine Research Institute. The fall sports season is going well.

Scott Hall said that progress reports went out and that the

progress reports can be seen in digital form. The tech team is making good progress, and the laptops are now out.

Nate Stubbart reported on the CHS fall sports season. The boys soccer team is 7-1-2. The girls soccer team is 2-7-2. The cross country team won the MVC mid season competition, and the golf team has qualified for the state meet. The senior soccer games will be played next week. A captain's club has been formed. With the help of Larry Dunphy, a Ski Club has been established. This club will include CHS, CCS, Madison and Valley.

Tim Richards updated the board on the goings on at CHS. 22 units of blood were collected at Tuesday's blood drive. The Fall College Trip will be November 3 - 4, and students will visit UNE, BC, Endicott, and USM. October 19 will be Community Service Day, and there will soon be an Anti-Bullying presentation at CHS.

Scott Leahy said things are going relatively smoothly. Lines are being drawn in the ground for the placement of the CHS sign. A bus that had issues has been repaired. Representatives from Siemens will visit RSU 74 on October 7 to examine the district's heating plants.

Jaime Ela said that October is a busy month will state reports. She updated the board on the work of the instructional coaches, saying that Brian Twitchell is running a book study, teaching algebra class, supporting 6-8 RTI programs, and helping to implement new software. Lisa Savage has been working to identify a new English/Language Arts program, teaching an English/Language Arts class, and an RTI class. Mrs. Ela has been working with the pre-school to select a math program. The proficiency based diploma law has changed, and now the current eighth grade students will be the first to receive a proficiency based diploma when they graduate from CHS.

Mr. Beverage added that since every school system must create their own proficiency based system because of the state law, he wished that the state would give districts more guidance.

Nicki Richardson said the number of students in special education has increased. Many reports are due this month. Staff schedules have been solidified, and the staff is being utilized well. Unified Bowling has begun.

Committees: The transportation/maintenance committee met September 14. The policy will soon discuss Anti-Bullying policy and will discuss the benefits for retirees who return to work.

Citizens: Erik Carey spoke regarding the agenda item that dealt with a cooperative CHS/Madison High School baseball team. He said he did not disagree with the proposed cooperative team but wondered if the administration/board had looked into why so few athletes were playing sports at the present time. Board member Wayne Rugh speculated that the reason had to do with teenagers being too busy using their phones.

Judi Smith asked Mr. Beverage to clarify his earlier stated reservations with the adult education program. He replied that he could not locate files, notebooks, or documents. He was unable to determine what students had been in the program and what their attendance had been.

Executive Session: Following the executive session, the board approved a student's re-entry.

Actions: RSU 74 Teacher Performance Evaluation and Professional Growth Model 2016-2017: Approved without discussion; RSU 74 Administrator Evaluation Framework 2016-2017: Approved without discussion; CCS Parent and Student Handbook: Approved without discussion; CHS Parent

and Student Handbook: Approved without discussion; CHS/JMG Overnight Trip, Oct. 19 - 20: Approved without discussion; CCS 8th Grade Norlands Trip, Nov 5 - 6: Approved without discussion; Job Description for Instructional Coaches: Approved without discussion.

CHS-Madison Cooperative Baseball Team: There are currently ten students at CHS interested in playing baseball, and the same number at Madison. Neither AD is comfortable going forward with a team with only ten players. For this reason, it seemed necessary to them to combine the two teams. According to Nate Stubbart, the low numbers of athletes interested in playing baseball was not unique to CHS or Madison. It is, he said a problem throughout the Mountain Valley Conference and the entire state. Some of the reasons he cited for the low athletic numbers throughout the state included technology, parental involvement, lack of feeder programs, etc.

There was much discussion of this item by the board. Ultimately, the board approved the cooperative team for one year.

Board Member to Attend the Fall Delegate Assembly: I believe, a board member will be attending this conference in late October. Unfortunately, as I look at my notes, I realize I neglected to write down the name of this individual, and I am unable to recall who it will be.

Gear Up Field Trip: One CHS student, one CCS student, a College Access Team representative and a parent will attend this weekend conference. The board voted to approve.

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From the Library Director: We had a great donation to the library - a new Macintosh computer with large screen which complements our three desktop PCs and one wireless PC for your use. So for you Mac users, here's your chance to show us all the ins and outs of the system since I'm a PC person!

The second big news we have is that we will be on van delivery that connects us to most major libraries for inter-library loan. You no longer have to send these items back on your own, and it enhances our offerings so much. Any items in regular circulation in most Maine libraries are now available to you at no charge or fuss with returns. The van will drop off and pick up every Thursday morning, starting the first of November. We are still working out the details, but at this time it means you can pick up your selections Thursday afternoon, keep them for about two weeks, and return in 13 days on Wednesday so we can package and leave for Thursday pickup. Eventually, this will mean we can focus our purchases on new releases and other items can be available through this service.

The children's hour for November will be held at its regular day and time: November 12 at 9:00 am!
