Dear Friends,

It is a privilege to represent Maine in the United States Senate, and I am deeply grateful for the trust the people of Maine have placed in me. Public service is a responsibility I take seriously. In 2012, I reached a milestone by casting my 5,000th consecutive roll-call vote. I have never missed a single roll-call vote, a record unique among current Senators.

As we enter 2013, the economy and jobs remain my top priorities. As a senior member of the Defense Appropriations subcommittee, I am committed to keeping our nation secure and our skilled defense workers on the job. I secured funding to increase the shipbuilding programs at Bath Iron Works and advance essential modernization projects at the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard. I was honored to receive the Navy League's Congressional Sea Services Award for 2012 as the leading advocate for our maritime services and US shipbuilding.

Maine's economic future recently received a boost with significant federal funds for deep-water, offshore wind energy research and development at the University of Maine and in private sector firms. Maine has some of the strongest and most consistent winds off our coast, and we have some of the world's leading researchers. These funds will help Maine be a world leader in developing this clean, renewable energy source, ultimately resulting in the creation of thousands of good-paying jobs for our state.

As a leader on the Transportation Appropriations Subcommittee, I am also working to ensure that investments are made in our transportation infrastructure. Early last year, construction began on a modern, safe, and efficient replacement for the Memorial Bridge at Kittery, a project for which I worked to secure funding. Working with the State Department of Transportation, I also secured federal funding to replace the aging Martin Memorial Bridge in Rumford and the decrepit Richmond-Dresden Bridge. In 2013, I will continue to seek funding for improvements in our roads and bridges to make traveling safer and more efficient for our citizens and to facilitate commerce. It is also gratifying to see the heaviest trucks on the Interstates where they belong rather than on our downtown streets and country roads. This is the result of a law I authored in 2011.

Maine's environment is critical to our economy and the health of our residents. I opposed efforts in 2012 that would have weakened the landmark Clean Air Act and would have exposed our state to emissions from coal-fired power plants elsewhere. At the same time, I have continued to work with a bipartisan group of Senators to ensure that federal regulations on industrial boilers





protect our environment without imposing onerous burdens on our forest-products industry and other manufacturers.

Many Mainers contacted me last year to express concern about the Postal Service, which is essential to our economy and our way of life. Last year, the Senate approved legislation I coauthored to help put the Postal Service on a sound financial footing since it has been losing billions of dollars. Although the House failed to act on our bill, the Postal Service has heeded my requests to keep open the vital mail processing center in Hampden. I will continue to work to ensure that all Mainers, regardless of the size of their communities, have access to the postal services upon which they rely.

As the daughter of a World War II veteran wounded in combat, I know how important quality, accessible health care is for our veterans. This past year, I worked to ensure that our rural veterans' health care facilities are fully staffed and to strengthen our Veterans' Homes. Federal health agencies also began an investigation into whether Maine veterans were exposed to toxic defoliant chemicals while training at Gagetown, New Brunswick.

With shortages of medications putting patients at risk, I co-sponsored legislation to encourage manufacturers to report anticipated production problems to help avert shortages. Through this voluntary approach, more than 200 potentially life-threatening shortages were prevented last year.

While Congress averted a huge increase in tax rates for middle-income American families and small businesses, there remains a lot of work to be done to reduce our unsustainable \$16.4 trillion debt. It is essential that we do so in a responsible way, but that Washington stop delaying decisions that will help shape our economy and future prosperity.

I remain committed to doing all that I can to address your community's concerns in 2013. If I may be of assistance to you in any way, I encourage you to contact my state office in your area.

<u>New Portland Fire Department</u> 2012 Annual Report

To the Citizens of New Portland:

During the year 2012 your Fire Department responded to the following 50 calls for assistance, of which 8 were request for mutual aid, which 3 of those were structure fires, 1 vehicle fire, 2 forest fires, 1 vehicle accident and 1 for standby at the mutual aid station. This is a decrease of 2 calls from 2011

This year our call volume has increased by 3 from last year's request for assistants of 47 calls. So far in 2013 till the middle of January we already received 4 calls for assistants

In submitting our budget request, I have tried to keep our budget as low as possible and still cover the needs of our town and residents.

This year we replaced all of our mobile radios as they were not narrow band compliant and could not be made to do so. Now all or our radios, both mobile and portables are all narrow band compliant.

During pump testing this year our Pierce engine passed, but the 2005 VTEC pumper tanker was found to have sizable decrease in its pump capabilities due to substantial wear. We had the pump rebuilt and the truck back in service within a few weeks. We contracted with another vender who was able to perform this service at all most half the cost of the

last overhaul of the same pump.

This year we received small grant which is a 50% match grant to replace our forestry pump, which failed this year and was not repairable also to purchase some forestry hose, fittings and along with 4 portable radios. We have also submitted a grant to the SKT Foundation trying to replace our aging thermal imaging camera, if we are successful this grant it does not require any matching funds.



I wish to express my thanks, recognition and appreciation to all the New Portland Firefighters who make up the Fire Department. Our community is very fortunate to have them.

Selectmen's Letter of Transmittal

The Board of Selectmen has been fortunate to have great people to work with during 2012 to run the day to day operations of the Town. We want to extend a huge thank you to all of the town employees and committees that dedicate so much time and energy to the Town each year. We recognize that there are many options for each of us to spend our time and are thankful that there are people willing to sacrifice some of that time to do what can be done to make New Portland a great community to live in.

The Town Clerk, Alicia Wills, and the Animal Control Officer, Lorie Agren, worked together to get a list of people who had not licensed their dogs as required. The list was extensive and Lorie reached out to each dog owner personally to discuss the importance of licensing the dogs and what enforcement actions would follow if the dogs were not licensed. It took some time to get everyone into the office to complete the licensing but it has been done. As part of this effort Lorie did a great job finding rabies clinics available locally where owners could get their dogs vaccinated for a fraction of the cost of going to the veterinarian. The Town collected substantially more in fees than previous years, which will be used directly toward the cost of animal control. This helps reduce the burden of costs to the tax payer. More important than that, to the selectmen, however is that we wanted all to be treated fairly. It should not be the case that some dog owners license their pets and others are allowed not to. So please if you are a dog owner, make sure they are vaccinated and licensed every year by January 31st. Thank you Alicia for bring this lapse of enforcement into awareness so that it could be corrected.

The town purchased a new grader this year. The new grader is larger than the old one and was put to good use this season. The old grader was sold with the proceeds from the sale used to make the first payment on the new one. The town owning its own grader has resulted in a cost savings over hiring a grader by the hour for smoothing gravel roads. In addition to the cost savings it allows more flexibility in when we are able to perform tasks with the grader and allows for additional ditching to be done without renting additional equipment.

On New Portland Hill Road, a large tree removal project was done that will allow a ditch to be eventually installed where there wasn't one before. This season the stumps will need to be removed and the ditch made. This will allow snow to be pushed back in the Spring keeping standing water out of the road, reducing mud and pot holes.

We have been told by the State of Maine bridge inspectors that the culvert at Indian Stream on the Middle Road is in bad shape. They have given us a proposed failure date that is pretty far in the future but have also said that they will be inspecting it every year going forward and will post it if necessary. Gary has gotten some preliminary pricing to put a slip line culvert in there to the tune of \$129,000 which is more than the annual summer road budget. Gary and the selectmen will be reviewing all options for this project and report back to the taxpayers. The Tannery Bridge has also been identified by the State to have issues and Gary is researching options for correcting as well.

The Planning Board has been reviewing its first permit application under the Wireless Telecommunications Ordinance. CMP has applied for a permit for the wireless units used for their network of Smart Meters in New Portland. Peter Virgin, who was a long time member on the planning



board, and served as board chairman for much of that time has moved out of Town and had to leave the planning board. Peter was a very active member of the board and is greatly missed already. Gabe Clark has taken a seat on the planning board to fill that vacancy. Welcome Gabe! Mary Butler and Alfred Bolduc have expressed their intention to retire from the planning board as well. If anyone is interested in learning more about what is involved in serving on the planning board please let us know.

The Selectmen look forward to working with you all again in 2013 to make positive improvements in our community.

TAXPAYER'S NOTICE

REAL ESTATE:

If you have constructed, altered or removed any buildings since April 1, 2012 and on or before April 1, 2013, please notify the Town Office at 628-4441.

BUSINESS PERSONAL PROPERTY:

If you have started a new business, you need to notify the Town Office. In accordance with Title 36, Section 706 of the Maine Revised Statutes, failure to furnish lists of taxable property or any of the aforementioned changes on or before dates requested will bar one's right to an abatement of taxes.

EXEMPTIONS:

Taxation is the rule and exemption is the exception. If you think your property should have an exemption, and you are not already receiving it, you have an obligation to make the assessors aware of the legal category of exemption the property may qualify for. All notifications and applications for exemption shall be made no later than April 1, 2013 for the 2013-tax year. In the case of property owned by individuals, possible exemptions for certain veterans and blind persons are described below.

VETERANS:

All veterans who will be 62 years of age on or before April 1, 2013 any widow or minor children of veterans who would have been 62 years of age as of April 1, 2013 should contact the Town Office to see if they are eligible for a tax exemption. Any veteran who is receiving 100% disability pension from the Veterans Administration should call to see if they are eligible for an exemption. Applications for veteran's exemption must be made to the Town Office on or before April 1, 2013. If you are currently receiving a veteran's exemption, you need not reapply.

BLIND:

Any person who is declared blind by a licensed doctor should notify the Town Office on or before April 1, 2013 to see if he or she is eligible for a tax exemption. If you are already receiving such an exemption, you need not reapply.

HOMESTEAD:

If your primary residence is located in New Portland, and you have owned a home in Maine for at least the twelve months prior to April 1, 2013, you may qualify for a homestead exemption. This application must also be received by April 1, 2013 to affect your 2012 tax bill. If you are already receiving this exemption, you need not reapply.

Rules of the New Portland Town Meeting

All comments or questions will be directed to the Moderator. No one may speak until they have been recognized by the moderator.

The article will be read in full and the recommendation of the Budget Committee will be stated. An affirmative motion will be stated. An affirmation motion will be made by an identified voter and seconded by identified voter. No negative motion, including a motion to pass over will be accepted. Voting will be done by a showing of hands. The vote will then be announced. The vote may be challenged by at least 7 voters.

Any decision by the moderator may be challenged. It can be overrules by a majority vote of the voters. <u>General town meeting provisions</u> (Maine Revised Statutes Title 30)

The following provisions apply to all town meetings:

1. Qualified voter. Every registered voter in the town may vote in the election of all town officials and in all town affairs.

2. Moderator elected and sworn. The clerk, or in the clerk's absence, a selectman or constable shall open the meeting by:

- Calling for the election of a moderator by written ballot;
- Receiving and counting votes for moderator;
- Swearing in the moderator.

3. Moderator presides. As soon as he has been elected and sworn, the moderator shall preside over and supervise the voting at the meeting and may appoint a deputy moderator to assist the moderator. If the moderator is absent or unable to carry out the duties, the clerk, or in the clerk's absence a selectman or constable, may call for the election of a deputy moderator to act in the absence of the moderator.

• All persons shall be silent at the moderator's command. A person may not speak before that person is recognized by the moderator. A person who is not a voter in the town may speak at the meeting only with the consent of 2/3 of the voters present.

1. If any person, after a command for order by the moderator, continues to act in a disorderly manner, the moderator may direct that person to leave the meeting. If the person refuses to leave, the moderator may have that person removed by a constable until the meeting is adjourned. That person may also be fined.

- When a vote declared by the moderator is immediately questioned by at least 7 voters, the moderator shall make it certain by polling the voters or by a method directed by the municipal legislative body.
- The moderator shall serve until the meeting is adjourned. The moderator is subject to the same penalties for neglect of official duty as other town officials.
- 4. Votes recorded by the clerk. The clerk shall accurately record the votes of the meeting.
 - If the clerk is absent, the moderator shall appoint and swear in a temporary clerk.

5. Written ballots. The clerk shall prepare the ballots. Ballots shall be of uniform size and color, and must be blank except that 2 squares with "yes" by one and "no" by the other may be printed on them.
