Mike, Louis, Ray and Brenda reported they had with a representative of the Maine Department of Environmental Protection during which they conducted inspections of potential sites for a town owned salt and sand shed on May 11.

Adjustments and Minutes: The board approved a handful of adjustments to the agenda, and they approved the minutes of the April board meeting.

Student Presentation: Brian Twitchell, Debbie Haynie, and several Solon third grade students demonstrated a number talk. Math examples were placed on a whiteboard, and the students not only found the answer, but they also were expected to explain how they came up with the answer. Benefits of this math talk approach include better understanding of math concepts, and better performance on tests.

Somerset Public Health: Matt L'Italien from Somerset Public Health spoke to the board. In the past eight years, the percentage of middle school and high school age students who use drugs and alcohol has decreased, and obviously this is positive. However, there has been a slight increase since 2015.

Reports: The expense report remains more positive than it appeared five months ago. The budget referendum vote is May 8. Absentee ballots are available. The Bugmobile was a big hit with the community. Mr. Tracy attended MDI, and he was very impressed. PBE is still the law. Though there has been much talk of revising the law, no changes have been passed yet. Mr. Tracy reported that he had received no

negative feedback regarding how the district handled the lockdown situation last week. He hopes to have a revised emergency plan in place by the start of 2018-2019. There will be a STEAM Academy for teachers in RSU 13-59-74. Grant money will pay teachers for attending. MEA testing was done in March and April. MEA Science testing is going on now.

Admin Reports: Tim Richards< CHS principal, noted that AP exams begin Monday.

Tom Desjardins, CCS principal, commended Jack Kaplan for his work with CCS seventh and eighth graders who participate in CobraPower. He said he was impressed not only with the physical work that Mr. Kaplan expects, but he also finds Jack to be a great motivator.

Jean Butler, Solon GS, told the board that the baskets at the board's table were created by the Solon First Grade students. 190 people attended the Bugmobile Event. There was food (Subway), and much learning, arts, and crafts which focused on bugs. The Big Map of Maine will be traveling to RSU 74, courtesy of the Maine Geographic Alliance. Solon and GS will be having a Maine Night, on May 16 and May 24, respectively. On the next three Thursdays, there will be Career Days held in grades k-5.

Nate Stubbert, athletic director, addressed the start of the spring sports season. The CHS softball team is in first place, and the Bridgeway Bandits are in fourth. The boys' and girls' tennis teams are doing well, and several track athletes have already qualified for the state meet. Middle school teams have also begun regular season action.

Laurie Agren, custodial director, said that all is going well. Parking lots are being cleaned and work is being done on the sports fields.
