- 1. Andrea called the meeting to order at 6:30 pm.
- Public Hearing for GA Ordinance: Stacie presented to the Board of Selectmen the new guidelines for the General Assistance Ordinance. There was a brief discussion regarding the changes from last year. Andrea motioned to accept the state's minimum's, Wayne seconded, and all were in favor.
- 3. Review minutes from previous meeting: The board reviewed the minutes. Raymond motioned to accept the minutes as written, Wayne seconded, and all were in favor.
- 4. Department Heads:

Gary Agren shared with the board the work that was still in progress and the things that were being wrapped up for the year. He briefed the board on hiring a new grader operator and went over his time spent with him in the loader training.

Kip Poulin updated the board on the mainboard on the engine. It will cost \$800 to replace the board. Currently, they are waiting on it to be installed. The delivery of the air packs has yet to be determined. Stacie will get budget figures to Kip so he knows where it stands.

Mike reviewed with the board some abatements.

Raymond motioned to accept the abatement request for Garrett Oswald in the amount of \$10.86. Wayne seconded, and all were in favor.

Raymond motioned to accept the abatement request for Casey Bowden in the amount of \$351.14. Wayne seconded, and all were in favor.

Raymond motioned to accept the abatement request for Kendall Knowles and Becky Redlevske in the amount of 101.36. Wayne seconded, and all were in favor.

Raymond motioned to accept a second abatement request for Kendall Knowles and Becky Redlevske for a second site in the amount of 101.36. Wayne seconded, and all were in favor.

Mike briefed the board on some other issues with abatement requests that will be brought before the board soon.

- 5. Items by the Town Manager: The board reviewed and signed the payroll and accounts payable warrants. Stacie presented to the board a 2017 Hazard Mitigation Plan to review. There was a brief discussion. Stacie would leave the plan at the office for the board to review at their leisure. Stacie updated the board on the office closures. coming up for training purposes. There was a brief discussion regarding a ceo violation that was pending. Stacie would try to contact the home owner to come to an upcoming meeting to discuss the progress.
- 6. Items by the Public: Mike inquired about an upcoming Sand/Salt Shed meeting. There was a discussion regarding the meeting, and it was decided to not hold the meeting. Brian asked a question regarding the fire department disposing of old hoses that didn't pass inspection. It was determined that the way Kip listed the hose for sale was sufficient.
- 7. Items by the Board of Selectmen: There was a brief discussion regarding the upcoming bid process for the cleanup of 54 River Road.

RSU 74 / School Board

The October school board meeting was held at the Embden Community Center.

Minutes: The minutes of the September board meeting, and the special September 19 board meeting were approved.

Superintendent Report: Mr. Tracy thanked the admin team for an excellent start to the school year. He informed the board that he had successfully worked with the Association to enact a Memorandum of Understanding to increase the health insurance benefit for part-time employees. This was done in the hope of recruiting more bus drivers. The Strategic Planning event will be held on October 26 and 27. 63 people have RSVP'd that they will attend. Though two new bus drivers have recently been hired, there is still a need for sub drivers. Citing the October 1 enrollment report, Mr. Tracy said that RSU 74 has two more students than a year ago at this time. He gave the board a copy of the Fall Newsletter that he has created. He hopes to also publish newsletters in the winter and spring. It is still early, but the current budget report is optimistic. CHS received a Silver Award from US News. The magazine rates Carrabec as the 16th best high school in Maine.

Appointments: Andrew Ferrari - MLTI tech lead, Marc Collard - Math League, Maurice Langlois - Advisory Dean, Janet Boothby - Advisory Dean, Aaron Baum - Advisory Dean, Stacey Robinson - Advisory Dean, Jenney Rollins -GS, ed tech 1, Michael Rowe - CHS boys' basketball

Resignation: Valerie Burbank, bus driver

Nominations: Michael Asselin – driver, Anthony Sy - driver

Admin Reports: Tim Richards noted that there is a blood drive on October 8 and PSATs on October 10. During October, 34 CHS students will be job shadowing. This is done through JMG.

Tom Desjardins has put a committee together for Veteran's Day. CCS will be having a Veteran's Week, and he asked the board to give him the names of any local veterans. Jean Butler said the year was off to a good start but had been busy. Solon and GS had Open House recently, and she thanked board member Heather Helinski for volunteering at the GS Open House. October will feature Fire Safety Week and Bus Safety Week. Grace Cram told the board that while a special ed teaching

position was cut during the 18-19 budget season, the 18-19 school year has brought a 12% increase in students with IEPs.

Committees: The Policy Committee met on September 12, and they reiterated the expectation that CHS diplomas will be GPA based. Buildings and Grounds met on September 19. Work will be done on the Solon gym floor and the GS gutters need repair. As a result of a safety inspection by the committee and Officer Mike Pike, the following recommendations were made: 1. cut trees and shrubs near windows, 2. get shatter proof coating for windows, 3. acquire more cameras. The committee also discussed the need for bleacher repair at CHS.

3M film for windows: The board approved the purchase of 3M film for windows. This is a safety precaution to make the windows less likely to shatter.

Norlands: The board approved an 8th grade trip to Norlands on October 19 and 20.

College Visits: The board approved a November 1-2 college trip for CHS sophomores and juniors. They will visit BC, Emerson, Saint Anselm, and Southern New Hampshire University.

Youth in Maine Government: The board approved the November 9-11 Youth in Maine Government event.

Policies: The board approved 19 policies.

Bleachers: The board voted to repair the CHS bleachers. Most of the money needed will come from an existing capital improvement account.

MSMA Fall Conference: Mr. Tracy discussed the MSMA conference with the board and encouraged members to attend.

Adjournment: The meeting ended at 6:44 pm.

New Portland Community Church News for November 2018


