Minutes for the Selectmen's Meeting July 5, 2018

Selectmen Present: Raymond Poulin, Andrea Reichert, Wayne Rundlett; Present: Stacie Rundlett, Brian Rundlett, Marilyn Gorman, Dallas Landry, Brenda Stevens, Judi Wills, Michael Malesky, Gary Agren, Scott Oliver.

1. Andrea called the meeting to order at 6:33 pm.
2. Raymond motioned to accept the minutes as written, Wayne seconded and all were in favor.
3. Department Heads:
 - a. Gary updated the board on paving of the Freeman Ridge Road by Pike Industries. The grader needs work done to it. There is ditch work to be done in upcoming weeks, along with gravel being spread on parts of the Middle Road. A few culverts will be changed and flailing work to be done on the back roads.
 - b. Mike discussed with the board that he plans on committing taxes between July 20 and 23. Tree Growth has gone down. He will update the board when he has a more specific date for commitment.
 - c. Brian updated the board on Tanker 2. It failed pump testing again. There is a major oil leak, and they are trying to confirm whether to have it fixed or not because of costs to do so. They may take it out of service permanently depending on their findings. Air packs are due to arrive within a couple of weeks. The board had not questions for Brian.
 - d. Judi announced to the board that there was no new news from the Recreation Committee. They have a scheduled meeting on July 12.
4. Items by the Public:

Scott discussed his concerns regarding the snow plow turn around that is near his driveway. He asked that the board

make sure that his driveway isn't blocked in the future winters. He also had a discussion regarding unlicensed dogs in the town. He stressed to the board that his neighbor Mr. Wulf has not licensed his dog since residing here. He voiced that this matter has not been addressed, and it should be. Andrea stated that she would reach out to the ACO, Lori Agren and try to resolve this issue. There was a lengthy discussion regarding fast traffic, people drinking while driving, and dirt bikes on the Hancock Pond Road. Stacie would contact the sheriff's office to see if the issues could be addressed.

5. Items by the Town Manager:
 - a. The board reviewed and signed all payroll and the accounts payable warrants.
 - b. There was a discussion regarding the next scheduled meeting and after discussing things the board agreed to reschedule the second selectmen's meeting to Monday, July 23. Stacie would make sure that it was posted so the public would be aware of the change.
 - c. Stacie reviewed with the Board of Selectmen of two Junkyard Violation Notices that were sent out prior to May 1.
 1. 48 River Road owned by Raymond Jordan
 2. 25 Bennett Hill Road owned by the late Rosemary Allen, of which her son Mike Allen is the caretaker. The board had a lengthy discussion regarding both properties and that they felt neither were in compliance to the town's ordinance. There was also a discussion regarding the Bennett Hill Road property and the health and sanitation issues with the dwelling and that it is a dangerous building. After a thorough discussion the board and Stacie decided to hold a public hearing regarding the issues for both properties. Stacie would post a notice for public hearing regarding the Junkyard Violations for the properties and she would also post and advertise for a dangerous building hearing for 25 Bennett Hill Road.
 - d. The board and Stacie decided to have Gilbert Taylor attend the August 7 selectmen's meeting to sign the snow plow contract.
6. The Board of Selectmen: There were no items by the board.

Minutes for the Selectmen's Meeting July 23, 2018

1. Andrea called the meeting to order at 6:32 pm.
2. Raymond motioned to accept the minutes as written, Wayne seconded and all were in favor.
3. Items by the Town Manager:
 - a. The board reviewed and signed all payroll and the accounts payable warrants.
 - b. Stacie presented to the board a copy of the draft snow plow contract for the board to review. At the August 7 meeting the final draft will be signed with Gilbert Taylor.
 - c. Stacie presented the current labor policy to the board. There needs to be an amendment made regarding full-time and part-time employees and the mileage reimbursement amount. There was a brief discussion. Andrea motioned to amend the labor policy for part-time employee to be 32 hours or less, Raymond seconded and all were in favor.
 - d. There was a brief discussion regarding code enforcement violations.
 - e. Stacie presented to the board an amended draft of the community room and equipment rental agreement. Stacie discussed with the board that recently there has been a few times that either the key or the table and chairs that were used off site were not returned in a timely fashion, and there was no notification about the delay in doing so. Stacie asked for the board to approve a change in this agreement which gave the town the authority to charge \$25 per day if the key and or table and chairs were not returned to the community room by the date entered in the agreement at the time of signing. Raymond motioned to accept this amendment, Wayne seconded and all were in favor.
 - f. Stacie had a discussion with the board about attending a municipal leadership workshop in September which will give her credits towards her certification for town manager. The board members were in favor of her attending this event. There was a brief discussion regarding Elected Officials Workshops.

4. Mike Malesky presented to the board the commitment papers for the 2018 Real Estate and Personal Property taxes. There was a discussion regarding the changes in valuation from 2017. After reviewing the paperwork, the board members signed the commitment papers and the mil rate for 2018 taxes were set at 18.1. Mike also updated the board on the proposed sand/salt shed site on town property. Gabe Clark spoke to the board regarding a piece of property which he will own soon and would offer to work with the town on selling a piece of that to the town if the town needed a back up plan for the sand/salt shed. There was a discussion regarding this proposed site. The board thanked Gabe for bringing the offer before them, and they would look into the matter if they needed a different site. Mike would try and get the state DEP officials, that were due to visit the town site on Tuesday, over to this site to see if it would be an option. None of the board members would be able to attend at the short notice. The board asked Stacie to attend the two meetings with the DEP officials. The board informed Mike that Stacie would be there on their behalf.

Meeting adjourned at 6:58 pm.

RSU 74 / School Board

The August school board meeting was held on August 1 at Carrabec Community School.

Minutes: The minutes of the July board meeting were approved.

Superintendent Report: Mr. Tracy thanked Lorie Agren and her crew for doing a great job getting ready for the start of 2018-19. He said that he and the admin team have been very busy with hiring new staff, ordering supplies, and making sure that everything is ready for the start of school. Four Carrabec High School students are interested in playing golf, and it appears that CHS will share a golf coach with Madison. CHS is looking for a cross country coach. Mr. Tracy will update the board at the September meeting about the academic goals for 2018-2019. Due to the changes in PBE law, RSU 74 can now determine whether to give out traditional or proficiency-based diplomas. As of now, the plan is to give out traditional diplomas. Mr. Richards is in favor of keeping the proficiency standards in place, and Mr. Tracy supports keeping the curriculum aligned to the standards. He feels there is need to continue curriculum work and vertically align the curriculum. The Strategic Planning Committee will meet on August 17. On July 19, the Buildings and Grounds Committee did a facilities walk with Officer Mike Pike.

Mr. Pike will be submitting some recommendations in writing, and the recommendations will be discussed at the September meeting.

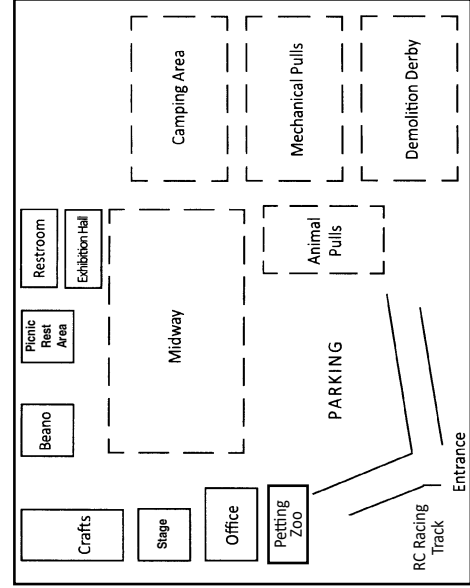

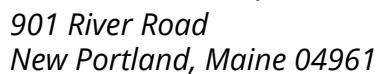
