Selectmen's Meeting Minutes for September 19, 2022

Roster: Selectmen: Raymond Poulin; Tina Poulin (absent); Wayne Rundlett; Stacie Rundlett, Town Manager; Harold Gayne

- 1. Raymond called the meeting to order at 6:29 pm.
- 2. The Board of Selectmen reviewed the minutes from the previous meeting. Wayne motioned to accept them as written, Raymond seconded and all were in favor.
- 3. Old Business: Ordinances There was a brief discussion regarding the proposed ordinances and the work to the current drafts to be sent off to the town's attorney for review.
- 4. Items by the Public: Harold Gayne spoke to the Board about becoming a member of the Planning Board. Raymond motioned to appoint Harold to the Planning Board, Wayne seconded and all were in favor.
- 5. Items by Department Heads: None
- 6. Items by the Town Manager: The Board reviewed and signed the payroll and A/P warrants.
- 7. Items by the Board of Selectmen: Raymond discussed the concern regarding trash and debris at one of the turn a rounds on Route 27. He asked Stacie to find a contact number and reach out to someone to try and get it cleaned up.

Wayne motioned to adjourn the meeting. Raymond seconded and all were in favor.

The meeting was adjourned at 6:53 pm.

RSU 74 / School Board

The October board meeting was held at the Embden Community Center.

The meeting opened with the Pledge of Allegiance.

Adjustments to the Agenda: Seven appointments were added to the agenda. All were after-school program positions.

Minutes: The minutes of the September 7 board meeting were approved.

Chestnut Trees: Richard Reichenbach and Randall Rothert spoke to the board about chestnut trees. They have 145 chestnuts, and they were interested in planting chestnut trees at all of the RSU 74 schools. The board expressed support for this goal. Mr. Reichenbach and Mr. Rothert will work with Robert Greene to select the best location at each school for the trees to be planted.

Data Presentation: Brian Twitchell, Amanda DeLeonardis, and Barbara Jordan discussed the Intervention process with the board. Mr. Twitchell explained the role of an Instructional Coach, the Interventionists, and Title One Ed Techs. EasyCBM and NWEA were discussed. Mrs. Jordan and Mrs. DeLeonardis described the strategies and materials they use when they are working with students.

Superintendent Report: 1.) Mark Campbell recognized Shirley Mellows for being the Staff Spotlight recipient for October. He praised the work she does getting young students interested in reading. He also commended Jean Butler and Jaime Ela for their work in planning the October 7 Workshop Day. He described the workshop as being educational and enjoyable. 2.) Mr. Campbell discussed his goals for 2022-23, and he mentioned communication with board members, academic improvements, attendance, and curriculum work. Board member Eric Ewing suggested that it also made sense for the board's superintendent evaluation committee to set some goals for the superintendent.

Admin Reports: 1.) Robert Greene said all is going well with maintenance/custodial. The work order system has been a success with a roughly 99% rate of positive reviews. Portland Glass will be in the week of October 17. Mr. Greene has met with Mechanical Services to discuss the pellet boilers. Transportation is also going well. Mr. Greene said like all districts, we could use more drivers. The drivers we have are very positive. The buses and vans are being washed frequently. Three buses are currently at O'Connor for repairs. It has been necessary on occasion to borrow a bus from a neighboring district. There have been some student discipline issues on the buses, and there has been one bus expulsion and several suspensions. 2.) Jean Butler said the first month had been a success The GS and Solon fourth and fifth graders went on a field trip to UMO recently, and the Solon students made an appearance on the WABI news. Her students will be honoring bus drivers in the coming weeks. 3.) Athletic Director Erik Carey praised Robert Greene and his staff. He has attended numerous soccer games both home and away, and the fields in RSU 74 are in the best condition. He commended Peter Campbell for a successful Spirit Week at CHS.

There has not been a CHS golf team this year, but Mr. Carey has regularly taken three CHS students to Diadema, and he said that has been a success. In response to a board member question, he answered there are currently twelve girls on the CHS girls' soccer team. 4.) Peter Campbell said CHS students had a great time during Spirit Week, and the senior class came from behind to win. The Homecoming Dance went well. 97 students attended, and there were no discipline issues. Mr. Campbell attended a soccer game and a math meet the night of the board meeting, and a senior recorded the highest Math Team score ever for a CHS student. He believes the student culture is improving, though there have been some discipline issues, many of them involving vaping. He has asked students to change and will be expecting teachers to change as well, in hopes of bringing students as far along as possible. He has been on some home visits to find students who are no longer enrolled, but once were part of the enrollment. He commended the great job that Foreign Language teacher Terri Hoops is doing. There will be a Dinner Theater performance in November. Mr. Campbell has met with students and teachers to discuss possible changes to the Student Handbook. 6.) Student Representative William Price echoed Mr. Campbell's words, and said Ms. Hoops class is enjoyable. He described her as being energetic and engaging. Foreign Language students at CHS will travel to CCS to work with elementary students in the coming weeks. Students are doing exciting work in art classes. He mentioned the success of the Math Team, and said members of the Student Leadership Council have lots of ideas about how to maintain a positive environment at CHS.

Committees: The policy committee met prior to the board meeting. They will bring some policy changes to the November board meeting. The Buildings/Grounds/Transportation Committee met recently.

Citizens: None spoke.

Flagstaff Lake Trip: This trip was postponed due to inclement weather.

Youth in Maine Government: The board voted to approve the November 11-13 Youth in Maine Government event. Students will learn about government, write bills, debate, vote on bills at the statehouse in Augusta.

New School Bus Bid: The board approved a bid on a new school bus.

To see if the RSU #74 Board will authorize the Director of Operations to work out details for training an RSU 74 employee on preventative maintenance for the bus fleet as well as secure supplies and equipment necessary to perform said maintenance. The board approved.

Adjournment: The meeting ended at 8:01pm.

Wire Bridge Sno-Travelers

The first meeting of the 2022-23 Wire Bridge Sno-travelers was called to order by the vice president with 13 members present. The secretary and treasurer's reports were read and accepted.

Trail Master: The trail master reported the grant applications have been sent into the state and have been approved. The groomers' hourly rate will increase with the 2022-23 grants. It was also reported a bridge on the Millay Hill Trail has been repaired and trail markers will be put up in fields soon. In addition to the grants received last season, the club also received a fuel reimbursement check.

Old Business: 1.) A motion was made, seconded, and approved to purchase an Otter Sled to tow behind a snowmobile to carry items needed for trail maintenance. 2.) The new brush cutter has been installed on the groomer and is ready to be used. 3.) A motion was made, seconded, and approved to purchase two storage boxes and to purchase metal stakes for bridge signs.

New Business: 1.) Discussion was held about whether to do a registration for the groomers with Inland Fisheries and Wildlife. It will cost \$35 per groomer, a one-time fee, for as long as we own the groomers. A motion was made, seconded, and approved to pay the fee. 2.) The club voted to pay an annual fee to Maine's Northwestern Mountains free guide which advocates and advertises for businesses, ATV and snowmobile clubs in this area. 3.) A club member expressed

an interest in helping with the maintenance of the groomers. 4.) A motion was made, seconded and approved to pay a club member to use his equipment to destump and derock some trails. 5.) Oil and filters will be purchased for the groomers. 6.) The club liability insurance has been paid.

The meeting was adjourned at 7:25 pm.

The next meeting will be November 12. It will be held at the Community Meeting Room, starting at 6:30 pm.
