Selectmen's Meeting Minutes, November 1, 2022

Roster: Selectmen: Raymond Poulin, Tina Poulin, Wayne Rundlett, Town Manager: Stacie Rundlett, James Reinhard, Kip Poulin, Brian Rundlett

- 1. Raymond called the meeting to order at 6:30 pm.
- 2. The Board reviewed the minutes from the previous meeting. Tina motioned to accept them as written Wayne seconded and all were in favor.
- 3. Old Business: There was a brief discussion to clarify the noise ordinance and lawyer fees.
- 4. Items by the Public: There was a brief discussion on lighting for the Wire Bridge.
- 5. Items by Department Heads: Kip Poulin, Fire Chief, discussed with the Board the need for two AED machines and possibly using funds from ARPA funds. Raymond motioned to use funds from ARPA to purchase two machines, Tina seconded and all were in favor.
- 6. Items by the Town Manager:
 - a. The Board reviewed and signed the payroll, A/P warrants
 - b. The Board reviewed and signed the September Treasurer's Report
- 7. Items by the Board of Selectmen:
 - a. Raymond motioned to appoint Mallory Stratton, current Deputy Town Clerk, to serve for Town Clerk until the annual March 2023 town meeting, due to a resignation by the current Town Clerk Jianna Pinkham. It was seconded and all were in favor.

There was a brief discussion regarding having a community dinner. No decisions were made.

The meeting was adjourned at 7:01pm.

The January school board meeting was held at the Solon Elementary School. The food was tremendous, particularly the cookies ... The meeting began with the Pledge of Allegiance.

Adjustments to the Agenda: Some appointments were added to the agenda.

Minutes: The minutes of the December board meeting were approved.

Presentation: There was no presentation.

Appointments: Paige Giroux - ed tech, CCS; Cyndia Rafferty -Tierney - ed tech, CCS; Lisa Cowan - CHS bowling; Ed Yahn - B-team boys basketball, CCS; Aimee Pomerleau - After-School Program, Solon; Julie Costiga - custodian, GS

Resignations: Bruce Dostie - CHS math, Doug Woodsum - CHS, part-time social studies

Nominations: James Logan: CHS, part-time social studies

Superintendent Report: Mr. Campbell did not add much to the written report which he had submitted to board members prior to the meeting. He did discuss some areas of the budget where spending seemed to be noticeably higher than last year. Transportation was of particular interest. Last year at this time, the district had spent \$21,000 on van runs, while this year the total has risen to \$66,000. We have more students being transported out of district this year, and there is an increased need for van monitors on those runs.

Admin Reports: 1.) Most of the administrators chose not to add to the written reports which they had previously submitted. Jean Butler welcomed board members to Solon, and she noted the snowman candy cups at the board table had been prepared by Jen Lachance's kindergarten students. She thanked her staff members for contributing food for the meeting. (Not to repeat myself, but the food was very good...) Finally, she noted with the holidays over January is a month with a heavy focus on instruction. 2.) With the athletic director, Erik Carey, at a junior high basketball game, Peter Campbell updated the board on CHS sports. At a girls basketball game on Saturday night, CHS graduate Cheyenne Cahill will have her number retired. Both the CHS boys' and girls' basketball teams beat Winthrop over Christmas break. Also, before Christmas, the CHS boys beat Madison. The sophomore class is conducting a fundraiser called Halftime Hoopla, where contestants can earn one dollar for making a lay up, five dollars for hitting a free throw, \$10 for a three pointer, and \$100 for a half court shot. 3.) There are vacancies for a special ed teacher and a math teacher at CHS, and Mr. Campbell is looking to fill those. Mr. Campbell was asked about mandatory English-Language Arts detentions at CHS. Students who are failing ELA are required to stay after school to complete work until they are caught up. This is being done in ELA rather than other subjects because ELA is required all four years of high school, and if a student fails at one grade level, they then fall into a situation where they need to take two English classes in a year. This creates scheduling problems and also presents a major challenge for the student.

Student Rep: William Price shared information with the board

highlighting the benefits of learning a foreign language. He noted the positive environment and good morale. He said teachers are working hard to help students pass their classes.

Committees: 1.) The Transportation/Buildings and Grounds Committee met on December 14. They discussed a bus replacement plan, electric buses. 2.) The Academic Committee also met on December 14. Mr. Twitchell discussed the ELA curriculum. Also the Literacy Coach position, which has not been filled since 2020, was discussed.

Public Participation: No one spoke.

Fingerprints: The board approved having the district pay for the fingerprinting of substitutes.

Photocopiers: The board authorized the superintendent to enter into an agreement with Kyocera to extend the copier lease for fiscal year 23-24.

Executive Sessions: The last two agenda items were executive sessions. The board chairman stated that he did not anticipate any action being taken following these items.

Next School Board Meeting: The next board meeting is scheduled for February 1 at CCS.

The Western Mountains Baptist Church had a busy couple of months at the end of 2022. During November and December the congregation at WMBC showed much generosity to women struggling with homelessness, children, and elderly by supporting several organizations in our local communities. Recipients included residents at the New Hope Women's

Shelter in Solon, participants of the Free Street Church's Kids Christmas Party in Skowhegan, Angel Tree families from the Carrabec Community School in North Anson and residents at the Edgewood Manor in Farmington. In addition to coordinating all the giving, special events were also held. Events included a Thanksgiving Potluck lunch, Family Game Nights, a Christmas Eve-Eve Celebration and a New Year's Eve Celebration, complete with fireworks. Hot homemade meals were delivered to 70+ elderly for November and December. And Sunday services were held both Christmas Day and New Year 's Day. WMBC was busy and blessed all at the same time!

As the New Year begins, WMBC weekly events continue: 1.) Sunday evenings at 6:30 pm is Youth Group for eighth through twelve graders. This group of teenagers did an amazing job hosting the New Year's Eve event. They provided a movie with popcorn, made homemade pizza for dinner, served ice cream sundaes, then played games before ending the evening with a bang. YG is a place for teens to form friendships, have fun, and to learn and grow in their faith. 2.) Monday evenings at 6:30 pm, a group of men gather for coffee and a Bible study. This is open to young and old. If you or someone you know would like to learn more about the Bible or what it means to be a Christian, or just want to fellowship with men who are passionate about their relationship with Jesus Christ, show up on Monday night. 3.) Tuesday mornings from 9:00 am to noon is a Ladies Sewing Group. No matter your sewing level or experience you will be welcomed to join; it is "sew" much fun. Come check it out some Tuesday. 4.) In addition to the WMBC weekly events, there are other happenings during the month, such as Men's breakfast at 8:00 am on the first Saturday, Family Game Night at 6:30 pm on the second Friday and Bridging the Gap (meals prepared and delivered to elderly) on the fourth Saturday.

Special for February is the WMBC "Cabin Fever Reliever" event for children under the age of ten. Bring the kids Saturday afternoon, on February 11, 1:00-3:00 am.
