Town Assessor

With the very recent adjournment of the Legislature comes the sunset of the Property Tax Stabilization Program (also known as LD 290). After only one year in the books, the program has ended, effected April 1, 2024. This is in response to concerns regarding inequity and reimbursement costs.

There will be no option for taxpayers to reapply at the town level, although the ending of this program has allowed for the expansion of other programs, including the Property Tax Fairness Credit and the Senior Property Tax Deferral Program. Information for these programs can be found on the Maine Revenue Services website.

The August board meeting was held at Carrabec Community School. The food included several healthy options. Needless to say, I avoided the food. The meeting opened with the Pledge of Allegiance.

Adjustments to the Agenda: One agenda item was moved up in the agenda. Another agenda item was removed and will likely be revisited at a later date.

Superintendent: Mark Campbell was hired as superintendent for 2023-2024.

Minutes: The minutes of the June regular meeting and the June 15 special board meeting were approved.

Board Chair and Vice-Chair: Troy Dunphy and Kevin Sousa will continue in their roles as board chair and vice-chair.

Handbook Presentation: The board reviewed the school 2023-24 school handbooks. A board member asked Peter Campbell which high school staff members would teach a couple of classes, and he answered.

Superintendent Report: 1.) Mr. Campbell stated that bus routes for 2023-24 are not yet finalized, but he hopes they will be by opening day. The revised school attendance zone lines have added some hurdles to finalizing this process. 2.) On the subject of revised attendance zones, some families have appealed to the superintendent to stay at their current school. These requests have been reviewed on a case by case basis. Some requests will be granted, while others will not be, depending on each individual circumstance. 3.) CCS principal interviews will be held on August 10. A tentative process has a candidate meeting with the full admin team on August 14, followed by a special board meeting on August 16. 4.) Brenda Stevens and Laura Layman expressed disappointment that Jaime Ela had left the district. Mrs. Layman spoke about having board members be part of hiring committees in the future.
