Dear New Portland Residents,

The weather pattern of snow Sundays and Thursdays has certainly helped bring our winter total snowfall near the yearly average over the past 3 weeks! It would be nice to get out and enjoy this snow base by taking off on a hike with snowshoes but with the consistently low temperatures and accompanied by high winds, I am happily enjoying the beauty of winter from inside the building!

The Policy Committee reviewed four policies this month and will be sending three of these policies for full Board review after minor changes. As well, the Board is sending forth a recommended form that should be completed when parents/ community members have concerns with resources found in the library and or being used in a course. The Board did not make any changes to Policy IHBG - Home Schooling as it still matched recommended wording from Maine School Management. The three with minor changes that now need to undergo a full Board review and two votes include Policy IHBGA- Homeschooling -Participation in School Programs, Policy IHCDA - Post-Secondary Enrollment Options, and Policy IJJ – Instructional and Library-Media Materials Selection. The new form that matches Policy IJJ is Policy IJJ -E Public Complaint About the Curriculum or Instructional Materials/Challenge of Instructional Materials.

The Buildings and Grounds Committee finished reviewing the needed work/repair lists for the district and asked Director of Operations, Chris Roux to budget for the replacement of carpets in both Solon Elementary and Garret Schenck School. The carpets are extremely worn and stretched creating unsafe conditions as the carpets have rolls/folds increasing the likelihood of staff and students to trip. The replacement flooring will either be tile or vinyl planking. The ideal new floor covering will not only be safer but also be easier to clean on a daily basis. As well the Director of Operations was asked to continue to explore options for installing a security system district wide that includes updated camera systems and swipe card entry systems. If that moves forward it will likely be a separate budget line.

The last committee meeting was a meeting of the Finance Committee. Building budgets were shared as well as the budgets for Special Education, Buildings, Grounds, and Transportation. Special Education currently shows a \$400,000 increase for out-of-district instructional programs. By the time the committee meets again, the Negotiation Team will have met with the support staff. While data for salary increases are readily available for staff covered by the Agreement for teachers, the total salary lines are dependent on the new salaries negotiated for the support staff. A reminder that legislation passed last year requires that educational technician's minimum salary be \$18.31 per hour, and for all others covered under this agreement at \$16.85 per hour. Final budget for 2025-2026 will be voted on at the April monthly meeting.

Adjustments to the Agenda: Two nominations were added to the agenda.

Minutes: The minutes of the January board meeting were approved.

Presentation: There was no presentation.

Superintendent Report: Mr. Campbell did not add to his report.

Nominations: Maria Cirelli - ELL Ed Tech 3, CCS; Tyler McGlashing - Ed Tech 3, CHS

Resignation: Shawn Gross, maintenance

Student Report: The student rep, Dayna Labonte, commented on what has been happening at CHS. The basketball teams are Augusta bound. The Student Advisory Committee has been meeting. The Winter Formal was a success. Most students seemed to like this year's midterm schedule better than in past years. The students handled ALICE Training very well.

Admin Reports: Bruce Dostie was not present at the meeting. Scott Hall, Jean Butler, and Chris Roux chose not to add to their written reports. Geoffrey Case responded to a board member's question, and briefly addressed the CCS Strategic Plan. Grace Cram responded to a board member's question. She and the special ed directors of Bingham and Madison recently met to discuss regional programming opportunities. Peter Campbell read a letter to the board. In the letter, he announced his decision to resign, effective July 31. He discussed what he felt were the accomplishments during his time at CHS. He also cited some areas where he felt improvements could be made. Board member David Royce commended Peter's performance at CHS. He also commended the work of the superintendent and Wendell Dunlap.

Committees: The Library/Technology Cmte met on January 8. The Policy Cmte met on January 15, and the Buildings & Grounds Committee met on January 22.

Public Participation: Wendell Dunlap, who has been subbing as a driver, inquired as to whether there is a board policy regarding the age in which a child can be dropped off at home if no adult is present. Board member Dallas Landry stated that he thought the superintendent communicates effectively with the communities.

Overnight Trip: The board approved a CHS Outdoor Leadership Ice Fishing Trip to Upper Roach Pond. The trip will be March 4-6.

Policies: The first reading of several policies were approved. Those policies included: Child Find, Individual Education Programs (IEPs), Curriculum Development and Adoption, Federal Procurement Manual, Supervision and Evaluation of the Superintendent

Executive Session: Administrative Contracts - When the board emerged, they voted to approve the administrator contract extensions and salaries which were discussed in the executive session.

Two More Executive Sessions: Two more executive sessions were on the agenda. The first was to discuss contract negotiations. The second was to discuss a legal matter. (Somewhat off topic, but "A Legal Matter" by The Who is a fine song.) I was told the board would not take any action following either executive session.

Adjournment: Since I departed during the executive sessions, I have no idea when the meeting ended.
