### Selectmen's Meeting Minutes for August 18, 2025

Roster/ Selectmen: Raymond Poulin, Janet White, David Veilleux, Town Manager - Stacie Rundlett, Lori Alyea, Pat Mitchell, Mindy Newman, David and Lynne Cary, James Reinhard

1. Janet called the meeting to order at 6:28 pm.
2. The Board reviewed the minutes from the previous meeting. David motioned to accept the minutes as written; Raymond seconded and all were in favor.
3. Department Heads: Pat Mitchell, Road Commissioner, updated the Board on the completion of the FEMA work. He also discussed the resurfacing of the East Bridge. There was a discussion regarding the dust on the dirt roads. Calcium would be coming later in the week. Pat shared with the board that flake calcium would have been double the amount of the liquid calcium. There was a discussion for future options of getting calcium spread during the summer months. There were also discussions on Pat getting quotes for town paved roads to be resurfaced. The board and Pat, all agreed it was better to be proactive and make sure we preserved the towns paved roads.
4. Items by the Town Manager: a.) The Board reviewed and signed the payroll and A/P warrants. b.) Stacie and Lori discussed with the board some issues that have been occurring at the Town Office with the public using the bathroom.
5. Items by the Board of Selectmen: There was a brief discussion regarding the speed limit signs.
6. Items by the Public: Lynne Cary asked the Board members if they had considered pulling out of the district? There was a brief discussion regarding the matter, no decisions were made. Mindy Newman updated the board about the Sheila Atwood Memorial; she also updated the board about the Storybook Trail at the Wire Bridge area.

1. Janet called the meeting to order at 6:30 pm.
2. The Board reviewed the minutes from the previous meeting. Ray motioned to accept the minutes as written; David seconded and all were in favor.
3. Department Heads: Kip discussed a call for the FD in one of the TWP's and a smoldering fire started from a lightning strike. He also updated the board on the status of hazards that were listed on the insurance report and how they have been fixed.
4. Items by the Town Manager: a.) The board reviewed and signed the payroll and A/P warrants. b.) Stacie shared with the board information on two accounts to remove from the books.
5. Items by the Board of Selectmen: a.) There was a discussion on issuing a waiver to the Lion's Club and the New Portland Fair for the Unnecessary Noise Ordinance for September 12 and 13. The Board approved the waiver to allow unnecessary noise until midnight on the 12th and 13th of September. The board asked Stacie to include with this letter a copy of the ordinance. b.) There was a brief discussion on the school board member who has resigned. The board asked Stacie to post this vacancy on FB and the website. c.) The board reviewed the abatement requests: 1.] Janet motioned to grant the request from Jonathan and Yorn Chesnutt, for the amount of 1,835.82. Raymond seconded and all were in favor. 2.] Janet motioned to grant the request from Susan Gates in the amount of 5.64. Raymond seconded and all were in favor. 3.] Janet motioned to grant the request from Kendall and Joyce Knowles in the amount of 84.60. Raymond seconded and all were in favor. 4.] Janet motioned to grant the request from Susan and Greg Shaw in the amount of 1,027.89. Raymond seconded and all were in favor. d.) The board reviewed the DOT Tannery Bridge Report. No decisions were made. e.) The board reviewed and signed a Quit-Claim Deed for Dale Earle. Janet briefly discussed with the other board members the employee performance sheets that have been used in the past and inquired which one they would prefer to use. The performance evaluations will be taking place sometime in November.
6. Items by the Public: Walker Flemming discussed with the board his concerns with Millay Hill Road and the town's responsibility for summer and winter maintenance. No decisions were made at this time. Janet would like to see the road and do some research before she felt comfortable with making a decision. Lynne Cary discussed with the board her thoughts on her either

being appointed to be a school board member to fill our vacancy or to sit on a committee that will be doing research regarding the options for New Portland and RSU #74.

The meeting was adjourned at 7:23 pm.

## Superintendent RSU 74

September 19, 2025

Dear Residents of New Portland:

Schools are in session! Students and staff have settled nicely into the new school year. We did send out a message to parents indicating that we were requesting children being dropped off by parents daily, be dropped off at the door. With additional steps taken to increase building security, not having the doors wide open in the morning for anyone to enter only made sense. So far, other than a couple anxious pre-K students, this has been received well by the communities. We appreciate the support for this additional step for security purposes.

At the last board meeting the board was asked to support the addition of a Dean of Students position to support administration at Garret Schenck and Solon Elementary. The rise of behaviors in the lower grades was having an impact on the running of these buildings, and the students in the rooms of the lead teacher who were consistently called out to help support a student. With the current principal being in each building a half day, the times lead teachers were asked to step out to deal with behavior issues was significant. After discussing the need and potential ways to fund the position, the board did authorize the formation of the position. The board did request that as they were building the 2026-2027 budget to be presented with data to determine the effectiveness of this investment on reducing behaviors to help determine if the position will continue beyond the current school year..

This week, there were two sub-committee meetings. The first was Policy Committee where the subcommittee continues to work through the required policies that have not been reviewed in the past five years. The committee is sending six policies to the full Board for first readings with four of the six with minor changes while two will be completely revamped. These policies can be read by clicking on the agenda for October 1 once it is posted. The second committee meeting was the Buildings, Grounds and Transportation subcommittee. Their discussion was a review of the five to ten year improvement plan assembled last year. While some members aired their ideas of adding to the bus garage where most of our

maintenance is done in-house now, the need for the space is there. The discussion also looked to address the need for additional storage as none of the schools have the proper space they need to store materials and supplies. In the end, the sub-committee felt the ten year bus replacement plan needed to be revisited with the recommendation for replacement of two buses in the 2026-2027 school year. A reminder if we receive State approval to buy bus(es), in the following year we see reimbursement funds for these purchases.

The next meeting of the board is scheduled for October 1, 2025. Respectfully...

## **School Board**

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The Meeting: The September school board meeting was held at Solon. The brownies were excellent, and I am always a fan of cheese, pepperoni and crackers. So I was a big fan of the food options. (There may have been fruit, but if there was I avoided it, and now have no memory of seeing it.)

The meeting opened with the Pledge of Allegiance.

Adjustments to the Agenda: Five appointments were added to the agenda.

*Minutes: The minutes of the August 6 board meeting were approved.*

Presentation: There was no presentation.

Superintendent Report: Mr. Campbell added a bit to his written board report. He discussed a few lines in the budget. He told the board he had sent info out to families asking them not to drop off kids at the schools before 7:20 am. He also stated bus runs were being slightly adjusted so that buses did not drop off students prior to that time.

Appointments: Seth Price - CCS boys' soccer, Matt Scheve - CCS girls' soccer, Kylee Dixon - CCS cross country, PJ Vicneire - CHS boys' soccer volunteer, Lucas Vicneire - CHS boys' soccer volunteer, Amy Price - CHS girls' soccer volunteer, Richard Lewis - CHS golf, Marc Collard - CHS Math Coach, Alicia Bedard - McKinney Vento, Lacey Frost - McKinney Vento, Amy Cates - CCS Case Manager, Kimberly Pooler - CHS Case Manager

Resignations: None

Nominations: Felicia Schobel - Special Ed/Ed Tech One, CHS

At the conclusion of the superintendent's remarks, a board member asked about the board meeting schedule. Several years ago, there were two board meetings a year held at GS and Solon. Now there is only one at each of those schools. The board member wished to see the schedule changed back so that there would once again be two meetings at both GS and Solon.

Admin Reports: 1.) Scott Hall did not add to his written report, but he answered a question about NWEA testing. 2.) Jean Butler told that board the table settings had been created by Mrs. Lachance's kindergarten students. She said she was pleased with the recent renovations

that had been made at Solon and volunteered to take board members on a tour at the conclusion of the meeting. The Solon Open House will be September 18, and the GS Open House will be September 24. The GS Open House will have a 100th birthday theme in honor of GS having reached the century mark. 3.) Tammy Wyman, special education director, said she had been busy getting to know her staff. A board member asked a question regarding superintendent agreements. 4.) Mr. Case thanked Anson Academy for a recent grant and the purchase of t shirts. Two board members who recently chaperoned the eighth grade Moosehead Lake field trip praised the trip. They also expressed disappointment there would be no eighth grade Huts and Trails trip this year. Mr. Case explained after taking two days out of the classroom for Moosehead, there was a feeling the loss of additional class time would be educationally damaging. This was a factor in the decision to eliminate the Huts and Trails trip. 5.) Bruce Dostie said the year at CHS was off to a good start. He thanked new Dean of Students/AD Rachel Merrill for her work. 6.) Rachel Merrill gave a CCS sports update. There are 14 on the boys' soccer team, 14 on the girls' soccer team, and six running cross country. There are opportunities for CCS students to play golf. 7.) Chris Roux did not add to his report, but he did field a question about a change in protocols for bus drivers. In recent years some bus drivers have kept their buses at their home, rather than at the bus garage. This practice recently changed, and all buses are housed at the bus garage. A board member raised the concern this might inconvenience drivers. Mr. Roux gave his rationale behind the change. He said if the buses are at the garage, the mechanic can work on them in a more timely manner. If a report of an incident is made, it is more convenient to pull the camera if the bus is right at the garage. Also, in the instances where a bus doesn't start in the AM, it is easier to solve if the bus is at the garage than if it is at a driver's home. 8.) Student board rep Henry Lindeman said that the year at CHS is off to a good start.

Public: 1.) Rachel Layman mentioned the change in bus protocol. Mr. Roux added to his previous remarks, and said all drivers were having their contracted hours filled and paid. 2.) Missy Miller spoke about k-5 numbers. There are 90 in the CCS k-5, 77 at GS, and 60 at Solon. Fifth grade was a particular concern. There are 22 at CCS, nine at Solon, and 15 at GS. Mrs. Miller raised equity issues, sought to even out the numbers somehow, and hoped for some sort of appeal process on the occasions when the superintendent allows a student from outside the designated CCS school zone to enroll at CCS. 3.) A Solon parent spoke about the changes that have been made regarding public access to the buildings. She felt that the goal of keeping kids safe was good but didn't like being restricted from the building.

Committees: I didn't hear a committee report, so I am going to speculate that no committees met in the last month. (I will also admit that it is *possible* that there was a committee report, but it was brief and I wasn't paying attention.)

Dean of Students, GS/Solon: There was much discussion and debate surrounding the issue, but the board voted 10-3 to add this position.

Principal, GS/Solon: Jean Butler was the nominee. This item received a great deal of discussion. There were questions surrounding Jean's July resignation/return. The superintendent said there were four applicants, but the hiring committee did not choose any as the preferred candidate. The board voted 11-2 to hire Jean as principal for 2025-26.

Executive Session: legal matter

No action or discussion was anticipated following the executive session, so I did not stay for the final agenda item which was... Adjournment:

**Dog License Reminder  
New Portland Town Clerk's Office**

Dear Dog Owner,

**It's that time again! Dog licenses can start to be issued on Wednesday, October 15, 2025.** Please come to the Town Office to license your dog(s) at your earliest convenience. **Be sure to come in before January 31, 2026 to avoid paying the late fee of \$25.00 per dog.** Any dog that remains unregistered will be summonsed to court by the Animal Control Officer... So please do not delay! **These fines and deadlines are required by state law and cannot be waived.**

Remember if your dog(s) is here for more than seven (7) days, then you need to license your dog(s). If your dog(s) is six (6) months or more in age, then your dog(s) need to be licensed. In addition, if you no longer have your dog, please call me at 628-4441 as soon as possible so we may update our information.

To re-license your dog, you can come to the New Portland Town Office. Our regular office hours are Monday – Wednesday 10:00 am – 5:00 pm, Thursday 12:00 pm – 6:00 pm. You may also re-license your dog through the mail. **Please send a copy of the dog(s) Maine rabies certificate** and a check payable to the "Town of New Portland" for the appropriate fee, and we will process the license and return the paperwork and the new dog tag(s) to you. **Please use the form provided at the bottom of this notice if you are mailing your information in.**

Thank you for your attention to this important notice. Dog licensing ensures rabies vaccination, which protects the health of your pet and your family.

**Remember, all dogs in the State of Maine are required to be licensed.**

The Licensing fee is \$6.00 for neutered or spayed dogs and \$11.00 for male or female dogs **if licensed BEFORE January 31, 2026.** The fees will be \$31.00 for neutered or spayed dogs and \$36.00 for unaltered dogs **if licensed after January 31, 2026.** Please include a self-addressed stamped envelope with your copy of the Maine rabies certificate and payment to:

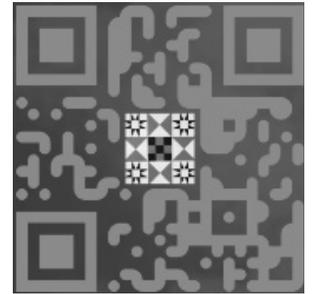

Vendors may now sign up for our November 8 Craft Fair. Spaces are \$20 per spot. You may sign-up online or at the library.

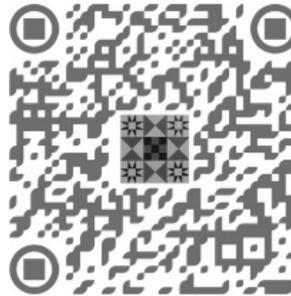
