# Selectmen

*Selectmen's Notes:* On January 19 and 27, 2026 at 6:30 pm, the selectmen held an informational public hearing in the meeting room at the fire station. On the January 27, the public hearing was followed by a special town meeting. What's up you may ask?

Remember the damaging huge floods we had in 2023? Those flood waters washed out culverts, damaged many areas of our dirt roads. That resulted in over 180,000 dollars in repair work

Since the floods, we have been working with FEMA for reimbursement funds. With the help of Ron Nunes who was road commissioner at the time of the floods, we have finally received all of our FEMA funds.

Much of the work on the damaged roads were repaired during the summer maintenance program of the years of 2023, 2024 and 2025. All of this work was paid for by our summer road budgets. Some new repairs were requested by FEMA, like the rocking in the ditches on New Portland Hill Road, larger culverts around the town, graveling on certain hills, etc.

So now that FEMA has signed off on all projects and has given us all of our funding, and the road commissioner was frugal with budgets, the select board was tight with funds, we have some capital to work with which will not come from taxation.

The Town now has \$125,000 in Fema reimbursement funds. The spending of this money is up to the select board's discretion. We hope to purchase a new Ford F550 with snow plow set up for \$75,000 dollars. This is a small dump truck that will be very useful to our town. The truck's sticker price is near \$98,000; this is a good deal.

The truck will be used for summer maintenance for now. It will be able to pull the newly rebuilt rock rake in the spring, help with brush cutting, some gravel work, tow a calcium spreader to coat roads after grading and more. This purchase is similar to when we brought the grader. We will no longer need to pay state rate to use someone's private equipment. It will save money in the long run.

This will leave \$50,000 in FEMA reimbursement money. All this money is in surplus, thus the reason for the special town meeting. The selectmen need approval to take money out of surplus. At the time of writing this article, we do not know the outcome of the two meeting.

Remember that there is a small food cupboard at

the library if you find yourself in need. No judgment just come get help. Open same hours as library.

Our annual town meeting is March 7. Voting for town positions is March 6; both take place at the fire station. Please attend if possible.

1. Janet called the meeting to order at 6:35 pm.
2. Department Heads: a.) Kip discussed with the board that there are approximately 20 thousand dollars in outstanding invoices for repairs done on the fire trucks. The business owner was supposed to send them and we still have not received them. Stacie would reach out to the business owner so we could get the invoices and get them paid. Kip discussed with the board his proposed budget for 2026. He also discussed the need for new

turnout gear and the bottles for SCBA as their life span is ending and there is a need for new ones to be compliant. They discussed options for these items. There was also a brief discussion regarding possible assistance from the county for gear/equipment/fire truck. No decisions were made. b.) Pat Mitchell reviewed with the board his proposed budget for 2026. And there was a discussion on the need for a truck for summer roads and a small sander. The board authorized him to start looking for these items and that they would use revenue from the FEMA/MEMA funds received. Pat also discussed with the board that he is going to be working with the USDA representative to find

out about possible grant or low interest loans for a building for the beginnings of a Public Works department.

3. Items by the Town Manager: a.) The board reviewed and signed the payroll and A/P warrants. They asked Stacie to contact the company that gave a quote for a gate to the Sand Salt Shed and let the owner know we are holding off until we can confirm plans for an additional building in the same area to house public works equipment, etc. They also asked Stacie to inquire with MMA about an insurance claim regarding the damages done to a fire truck last fall.
4. Items by the Board of Selectmen: The board reviewed the preliminary draft of the proposed budget spread sheets. Stacie apologized for not having more information for them and they scheduled an additional meeting to work solely on the proposed budget for Thursday, January, 14 at 6:00 pm. They asked Stacie to make sure that it was posted. Stacie discussed her thoughts on the 2026 Spirit of America award to be the library to recognize the members for their hard work volunteering to make the library a place to gather, learn, and read. The board was in agreement and stated if there was a chance to have more than one awardee to have David Cary and James Reinhard as well. Stacie stated she would look into that and get back to them.
5. Items by the Public: The library's representative Valencia Schubert went over the request for funds for 2026. The board was very receptive and thanked the library board members for all of their hard work.

## **Superintendent RSU 74**

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January 13, 2026

Dear New Portland Residents,

The new calendar year has started nicely. Students and staff have returned to classes and are focused on their studies. The younger students will be doing their winter NWEA assessment shortly. The results will be used to modify intervention strategies as necessary and provide teachers with a general sense of how their students are doing for being midway through the school year.

The Policy Committee will meet January 14 to review one policy, Student Representative to the School Board. As well, this committee is going to be asked to review the Strategic Plan for the district. I am not sure when this was last reviewed, but if this committee feels the need to address areas within this plan, we will call a full board workshop meeting to discuss how and when the document will be updated.

This Wednesday, the Buildings/Grounds/Transportation Committee will be meeting to make final recommendations for the 2026-2027 budgets for these. In November the full board gave administration permission to seek approval from the state to purchase two buses in the coming budget. We have

received confirmation from the DOE that we have been approved. A reminder that the district has to pay for the buses up front and will be reimbursed in the following year(s). As well, we will be traveling to Mill Stream School in RSU 54 to meet with officials from a company we are considering to replace all the lighting fixtures in all buildings. In 2021, the State of Maine enacted legislation that basically does away with halogen lighting fixtures. Over the past four years, companies and districts were given a grace period to make the changes as spare parts previously shelved permitted us to buy replacement parts during this period. As of January 1, we no longer have that as an option and must make the switch from halogen fixtures to LED fixtures. We will see and hear how the changeover will reduce our energy consumption by 83%. The costs for the new fixtures are recouped over the next seven years in electricity cost savings according to the company and Efficiency Maine.

Budget work will continue over the next few weeks so the Finance Committee can review an initial draft of the 2026-2027 budget in early February. The governor's budget continues 55% funding foreducation. The Finance Committee will review the budget draft with numbers from the state on funding to put together a budget to provide educational programs for the students in RSU 74. At this submission we have not received our EDU 279; the official document from the Maine Department of Education that informs us on our state funding for the coming fiscal year.

## **School Board**

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The January 7 school board meeting was held at CCS. Food options included a veggie tray, which appears to be the main course at all CCS board meetings, and chocolate chip cookies. I ate six cookies. I tried to avoid making eye contact with the veggie tray.

The meeting opened with the Pledge of Allegiance.

Adjustments to the Agenda: One resignation was added to the agenda. One nomination was removed, as the candidate withdrew.

Minutes: The minutes of the December meeting were approved.

Presentation: There is interest from some board members in having a School Resource Officer in RSU

74. Mike Pike, the SRO for SAD 59, spoke to the board about what an SRO does in a school system. Mr. Pike has been in his current SRO role since late 2024. He finds working with students to be rewarding, and he says this is the best job he has ever had. He spends about 50% of his time in RSU 59 at the 7-12 junior/senior high school, and 25% each at the 3-6 middle school and the preK-2 elementary school.

Obviously, a key aspect of the job is law enforcement and helping to bring a feeling of safety. There have been situations where he has made arrests in this role. However, in other situations such as if a student has a vape, he does not go the legal route. Instead, he counsels the student, and educates about the danger of vaping. Often he can be found in classrooms presenting on topics such as bullying and self-esteem. His background in law enforcement allows him to help in the development and implementation of emergency preparedness, safety plans and drills. During non school times, the SRO still has responsibilities. He patrols in Madison and helps with the rec department. Since he began as SRO, there have been fewer juvenile-related 911 calls in Madison.

He is employed by Somerset County. The cost is \$120,000. A grant picks up one-third of the cost, and SAD 59 and the town of Madison each pick up one-third of the cost. Madison, Skowhegan and Fairfield are the only Somerset County school districts with full-time SROs. Pittsfield has a half-time position.

Appointment: Jim Davis - CHS baseball. In response to a board member's question, the superintendent stated Mr. Davis was the best candidate at this time to help maintain continuity in the baseball program.

Resignations: Paige Giroux - Title One Ed Tech, GS; Lynn Cary - School Board Member, New Portland

Nominations: Jordan Enos - Ed Tech One (Special Ed), CCS; Haley Davis - Ed Tech One, CCS; Jennifer Prickett - Ed Tech Two (Special Ed), GS; Kaiya Jefferies - Ed Tech Two (Special Ed), CCS; Kelsie Walter - Ed Tech One, GS; Alesia Poissonier - Ed Tech One (Special Ed), GS; Gabrielle Lord - Ed Tech, GS. A nominee's name appeared on the agenda for the CHS Guidance Secretary/Registrar position. In between the printing of the agenda and the meeting, the candidate withdrew. Mr. Campbell has approved a transfer request, and Nicole Shamaly will move into that role.

Superintendent Report: 1.) Mr. Campbell told the board that he is looking into the idea of RSU 74 establishing a day treatment program. Student needs have become more challenging, and when it is necessary to do an out of district placement, the costs are very high. He and Mr. Roux are exploring what buildings in RSU 74 territory might be suitable, and the Embden Community Center was one that was mentioned. This is only in the exploration phase. There

is no plan in place as of now. 2.) There is legislation that will require RSU 74 to replace most, if not all, of the lights in the schools. This will come at quite a cost, but the reps for various lighting companies have alleged the costs would be offset by energy savings in a relatively short time. One quote predicted an 83% reduction in energy consumption with new lighting. These figures seemed quite optimistic. When dealing with the Soviet Union, Ronald Reagan went with the approach that the US should "trust but verify". The Buildings and Grounds Committee plans to make a roadtrip to Mill Stream Elementary in Norridgewock on January 14. That school has updated its lighting in recent years, and the superintendent and board members would like to get info from RSU 54 regarding their experience in upgrading their lighting and just how much cost savings there has been. 3.) The school district recently sent out a survey to all home-school families to get a better understanding of why those families chose home-schooling instead of public school. Three responses were returned.

Admin Reports: Scott Hall did not add to his written report. Jean Butler gave a revised certification handbook to the board and asked them to review it. The board will vote on the revisions at the February board meeting. Tammy Wyman did not add to her written report. Geoffrey Case said the dioramas at the board table were created by Mrs. Schanz' third grade students. He added Jason Tardy will present an anti-bullying program for k-5, 6-8, and 9-12 on January 14. There will also be a performance for the community that evening. Bruce Dostie thanked the community for their support, and he said he was blessed to work for RSU 74. Rachel Merrill gave a sports update. The CHS girls' basketball team (as of January 7) had a record of 7-1, and the boys' basketball team was 5-3. Chris Roux told board members if they had any questions about lights to reach out to him. The student representative Henry Lindeman said the winter sports season was off to a good start.

Committees: No committees met during December.

Public Participation: No one spoke.

Policies, Second Reading: The board approved the second reading of policies dealing with Student Discipline, Parent Involvement, Code of Conduct, Service Animals in the Schools, Accountability - Reporting to the Public, Evaluation of Professional Staff, Unexpired Term Fulfillment/Vacancies, Board Declared Vacancy Caused by Absenteeism.

Breakfast After the Bell: The board voted not to take part in the Breakfast After the Bell Program. This has been the practice for the school district, as the

program would require the district to add additional staff. In addition to the cost factor, all students are currently offered breakfast upon arrival at school. If a student arrives after breakfast, but still wants it, that student will be fed.

Executive Sessions: Two executive sessions were on the agenda; they were removed.

Adjournment: The meeting ended at 6:55 pm.
