2. Department Heads: Pat Mitchell discussed with the Board that the truck was still at his house for wiring that needed to be done. Pat shared with the Board he would be hiring Rod Dunham to do the grading work this year. He updated the Board on the Deer Farm Road turn around. He discussed that the road sweeping would start in the next couple of weeks for the intersections and the parking lots. He marked trees on the Middle Road that need to be cut. He also discussed with the Board culvert projects for the summer.

2. Mark Campbell discussed the proposed 2026-2027

Dear Residents of New Portland:

At this time, I have presented the 2026-2027 budget to all select boards in the district. Our district budget meeting is scheduled for May 20 at 6:00 pm at Carrabec High School. The referendum vote will be primary election day, June 9, 2026 with the polling hours being from 8:00 am to 8:00 pm.

Summary of changes to our 2026-2027 budget: Reduction in staff: two teaching positions, one ed-tech, three regular ed, four FTE staff member transferred out of regular budget to Title I, one bus driver. New staff: Special education technician 3. Other budget factors of which to be aware: salary increase range between 3% to 3.5%, health insurance premiums are up 11.4%, no major building projects, one school bus. Budget summary: budget increase of \$317,000; state funds are up \$490,000; local share is down just over \$200,000. Budget booklets will be available at your local town office or may be picked up at the office of the superintendent in North Anson.

The Policy Committee met on May 6 to review a new policy on the ban of cellular devices (not limited to just cell phones). This policy change is necessary to address new legislation approved and signed into law this spring and must be enforced beginning August 1, 2026. This law mandates students may not have in their possession any cellular devices from the time school begins and until after the dismissal bell at the close of the school day. The committee also adopted the recommended policy from MSMA on staff use of these devices during school hours. The first reading of these policies is scheduled for June 3 with the second vote being at the special meeting of the RSU #74 Board of Directors on June 11.

The next meeting of the Board is scheduled for June 3, 2026. Respectfully...

School Board

The May 6 school board meeting was held at CHS. Food options included a fruit/veggie tray and chocolate chip cookies. The cookies were quite good.

The meeting began with the Pledge of Allegiance.

There were some adjustments to the agenda. Two resignations were added, and an edit was made to the list of teachers moving from probationary year one to probationary year two. An executive session was removed from the agenda.

Presentation: Garrett Schenck fifth grade teacher Angela Larlee spoke to the board about the plan to move the current GS playground. The GS staff would like to move the playground closer to the tar area behind the building. Doing this would make for easier supervision, as all the kids would be in one general area at recess time. They would like to add some features to the playground, such as rocks, boulders and stumps for kids to climb on. They would like to take the area where the playground is currently located and turn that into an outdoor classroom. The board was supportive of this plan.

Superintendent Report: The current financial projection shows the 2025-26 budget will finish up with roughly \$1,000,000 in carryover. Mr. Campbell said that a van purchase should probably have been included in the 2026-27 budget, as one of our vans is closing in on 200,000 miles. Money from the current budget will be used to purchase a van. Mr. Campbell recently signed the paperwork for the lighting project. CHS and CCS will go first. The superintendent met with Mr. Dostie and the CHS staff on May 4 to discuss the 2026-27 schedule. There will be an Elective Fair in the coming days, and the goal is more classes will then be added to the schedule. The JMG closing ceremony was held on April 30, and Mr. Campbell was complimentary about the work the students had done. He encouraged board members to look at the poster boards that were displayed in the CHS cafeteria. The board will again have a June meeting designed to honor support staff, teachers, admin and community members. There will be a staff barbeque on June 12. Board members were invited to attend and serve. A committee will be formed for the purpose of filling the GSS principal position. The committee will look over applications next week. I believe, May 16 was listed as a day for potential interviews.

After Mr. Campbell finished his report, a board member asked about the plan for eighth graders to move to CHS in 2026-27. The superintendent said he was "putting the brakes on that."

Resignations (effective at the end of the school year): Jack Kaplan - CHS Phys Ed; Sarah Dutch - 6th Grade, CCS; Shelby Obert - Phys Ed, Solon/GS; Shannon Richards - 5th Grade, CCS. Mr. Campbell noted that after Mr. Kaplan's many years, his departure would be a loss for the district. He wished the other departing teachers well.

Nomination: Anthony Perron - Mechanic

Admin Reports: Scott Hall, Jean Butler, and Chris Roux chose not to add to their reports. Tammy Wyman answered a question about the recent special ed audit. She stated it went well. There were a few minor corrections to make, but nothing that was a huge concern. Geoff Case gave board members a Six Word Memoir book, and he thanked Karen Pease for her work to bring about the book and the event. A board member commended the CHS baseball team's new uniforms. Rachel Merrill said local individuals had donated money to buy them. Another board member said the CHS track was in much better condition than in years past, and appreciated recent initiatives to bring about community involvement. Administrators were commended on the quality of their board reports. They were judged to be brief yet comprehensive. Committees: There were no committee reports.

Public: No one spoke.

Teachers Moving from Probationary to Continuing Contract: Kimberly Pooler, Keane Carlin, Cally Chick, Aaron Welch, Sarah Lent, Jennifer Meade

Teachers Moving from First Year Probationary to Second Year Probationary: Kayla Starr, Kelly Vicneire, Angela Dunton

Changes to Eval System: Teachers who choose the professional development option on their evaluations need nine hours in year one, and nine hours in year two. Going forward, they will be allowed to get eighteen hours over the two year period without a minimum number each year. The board approved the change. However, many board members expressed unhappiness with the current eval process. There was a sense the whole process needs to undergo revision. Mr. Campbell promised to work in that direction starting in September.

Adjournment: The meeting adjourned at 6:22 pm.

- ✓ Place materials in in vehicle, preferably in the trunk. Take care to keep the box(es) from tipping over in the vehicle
- ✓ On arrival, **please stay in your car.** Trained staff will inspect and remove materials from your car for you.
- ✓ **NEVER MIX CHEMICALS** ✓ **NO SMOKING**
